Executive Summary

Background Information
This Brief discusses perceptions and opinions of influential experts in China about key regional security issues as the U.SChina relations rapidly deteriorate with the U.S. President Trump's changes into hardline policies against China and China's tough responses.
Key take-aways
This Brief analyzes perceptions and opinions of the Chinese experts on following topics: first, the U.SChina relations and Indo-Pacific Strategy; second, North Korea's nuclear issue and sanctions; third, the ROK-China relations.
Key Implications
This Brief provides three key implications. First, strategic competition between the U.S. and China will continue to intensify, and South Korea is not free from such circumstances. It is urgent to prepare policy alternatives and scenarios. Second, the outbreak of COVID-19, mutual distrust between the U.S. and North Korea, and deterioration of the U.SChina relations are making the North Korean nuclear issue harder to be solved. It seems wiser to separate the issues of the U.SChina relations and North Korea's nuclear weapons and make different approaches respectively. Third, it is important to implement

measures to develop the ROK-China relations and strengthen security cooperation between the two by pushing forward an early visit of President Xi Jinping to South Korea, promoting security cooperation in non-traditional areas, and institutionalizing strategic communication channels including track 1.5 dialogues. �
